### 1. Rationale:

Radio Broadcasting II is offered as an advanced exploration of the world of Radio Broadcasting.

### 2. Course Aims and Outcomes:

#### *Aims*

At the end of the course, students will be prepared to produce industry ready shows and packages for radio, as well as edit audio using professional grade equipment.

#### *Specific Learning Outcomes:*

By the end of this course, students will:

- Have a clear understanding of audio editing tools like Garage Band and Adobe Audition
- Understand the foundational principles of producing entertainment based shows for radio.
- Understand the foundational principles of sound, audio, microphones and cable for professional use.

### 3. Format and Procedures:

During each six weeks cycle, students will have the opportunity to explore a different facet of production. Students will learn key points, and have hands on experience with industry grade equipment. At the end of each six weeks cycle, students will engage in a production project to assess their learning and mastery.

### 4. Course Requirements:

Students are required to come to class daily with the following materials:

- Paper (a reporter's notepad if available)
- A positive attitude
